### Degree Focus:

The BA in sociology is focused on the study of humans in society, and specifically in reference to their identifying groups (race, gender, sexuality, etc.) and the unique issues they can face. Sociology majors study social theory and social structures, research methods and the making and implementation of social policy. This allows majors to understand the cause of social issues, provide solutions, and influence positive social change. Graduates of the program are prepared for entry-level social research, analysis, public and social services, as well as workplace and community advocacy and activism positions. This program leads to a baccalaureate degree in liberal arts. It is eligible for federal financial aid, but not subject to the gainful employment requirements.

### Program Outcomes:

Sociology major graduates will be able to:

- Defend knowledge of foundational sociological concepts; specifically, concepts of diversity, social responsibility, human rights, and dignity and respect for others in society;
- Assess a variety of classical and contemporary sociological theoretical perspectives;
- Evaluate research methodologies within the sociological context;
- Critically evaluate sociological issues; and
- Apply sociological tools to impact societal issues.
