Grading System and Grade Points

PR =	(Progressing) Indicates student eligibility to continue to the next term of a multiple term experience, such as Dissertation courses, Applied Doctoral Project courses, and Internship, due to satisfactory progress in the experience regardless of whether required milestones have been met. Credits are attempted and earned. For Dissertation courses and Internship However , PR grades will be changed to Pass (P) only when the student completes all academic requirements for successful completion of Dissertation courses, Applied Doctoral Project courses, or Internship. For Applied Doctoral Project courses, PR grades will not be changed to P and will remain on the student's transcript even after the student completes all academic requirements for successful completion of Applied Doctoral Project courses. Students who have not completed all requirements of the experience after enrollment in the minimum number of terms required or who have not remained continuously enrolled since the beginning of the course experience may need to enroll in additional credits. Credits are attempted and earned.

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Applied Doctoral Project

Consistent with the philosophy and purpose of a PsyD degree, the Applied Doctoral Project (ADP) will demonstrate a student's mastery of a particular topic of relevance and the application of scholarly knowledge and skills. Given the broad diversity of topics, fields, methodologies, settings, and applications relevant to students' chosen careers within the University's PsyD programs, the nature and format of the ADP is by necessity flexible, including quantitative and qualitative approaches, action research, historical analysis, observational studies, theoretical inquiries, case studies, program evaluations, and other research methodologies.

Students are enrolled in Applied Doctoral Project for five credits (RES 8981-8985). Students satisfactorily progressing through the ADP experience, but not quite meeting the required milestones, may need to register for RES 8981-8985 multiples times until they meet the required milestones. Students not completing their ADP during that period and not enrolled in any other course or internship (for PsyD, Clinical Specialization students) will register for Applied Doctoral Project Extension to remain in the program.

Prerequisites, timelines for completion, and attendance requirements for Applied Doctoral Project, as well as a detailed explanation of each step in the process, are described in the Applied Doctoral Project Handbook.
